7TH GRADE STEM DESIGN CHALLENGE

Mrs. Carter's 7th grade FOCUS students collaborated with Mrs. Stemen's 3rd grade science students to complete the MacGyver STEM Design Challenge. The 7th grade students first experimented with the design challenge and became "design leaders" before mentoring our 3rd grade students. Over 100 classes participated across the state of Ohio. They learned about how energy from a wind turbine can generate electricity and power our homes and businesses. In this challenge, students implemented the engineering design process to design, build, test, and improve a MacGyver Wind Lift. They tested the power of their project by measuring how many pennies their turbine can lift. Using the data collected from their experiment, they calculated which turbine is most powerful. The success of the challenges helped to empower our students to live what they learn and show their families how to be smart energy consumers. This was a wonderful project for our students provided by the Ohio Energy Project.

SAVE YOUR BREATH

We had thirteen 7th and 8th grade students in the after school STEM Program this year. We met on Wednesday's after school for an hour for about 12 weeks. We partnered up with The Challenger Learning Center of Lake Erie West in Oregon, Ohio who is affiliated with NASA Glenn Research Center in Cleveland. The Challenger Learning Center is one of 48 centers in the world that was created in 1986 by the families of the Challenger 51-L crew tragically lost during the Challenger's tenth mission. Each week students met with a facilitator from the Challenger Learning Center via Zoom who led the session.

This year's topic was Save Your Breath. The ultimate goal that we were working towards was for students to build and test a data-collection system consisting of a sensor, microcontroller, and transmitter that could be used during lunar (moon) exploration. Students then used computational thinking practices to modify their system to detect carbon dioxide in model spacesuit helmets and signal an alert if CO₂ exceeded acceptable levels. Students tested their system through a simulated CO₂ build-up incident.

Each week students learned something new with technology. The program was run through Google Classroom, which was a new platform for students to figure out. They learned how to create a video in Wevideo and how to code using Code.org. Students worked in groups of 4 and were challenged to create a team name, a team patch, and create a journal documenting all of their work. Students also connected circuits using the program TinkerCad. All of these learning sessions came in handy when we traveled to The Challenger Learning Center to build their models.

While at The Challenger Learning Center students completed different challenges to determine codes to open a locked box. Each of the challenges they faced help to advance them with their build of the model space helmet. Students were required to hook up and code an adreno board and wire it to a bread board that would then connect to the sensors in the helmet. Once the build was finished students were given a tour of The Challenger Center. They got to sit in a simulated space shuttle, see what it would be like to work on the International Space Station and sit behind a computer in Mission Control.

Be on the lookout for the students' videos on the school website and social media. These videos will showcase all of their hard work over the last 12 weeks.

5th grade students enjoyed working outside in the nice weather learning about friction and gravity. The students were playing various games like dominos, Jenga and corn hole to see the effects of gravity and friction during these experiments.

FFA AWARDS



National Chapter Award

For only the 6th time in school history, our FFA chapter earned a rating of National Gold Chapter for Ohio. This goes to top 10% of chapters in the State of Ohio and allows our chapter to apply for National Three-Star Chapter among other honorees at National Convention in October. The work to earn such an honor comes from the elected Chapter Officers of planning, organizing and conducted at least 15 unique chapter lead events in a year that covers a wide variety of areas.

Spencerville FFA Learns and Earns with Supervised Agricultural Experiences

Our FFA members have over 165 different SAE projects. They have worked over 13,590 hours in our SAE projects during the past year. They have brought in over \$84,611 from their paychecks, livestock sales, crop sales, and other income sources from our projects in the past year. With their SAE projects, we have spent over \$10,033 at local businesses for our projects ranging from seed, fertilizer, animals, rent and other types of expenses. They have volunteered over 256 hours in 70 different community service activities outside of our SAE projects and FFA activities. With these projects, we will be honoring 10 FFA members that have excellent project records for Chapter Proficiency Awards. Specifically, we will recognize Ryan Kaverman for earning a \$1000 SAE grant from Bob Evan's for which he was in a nationally promoted 30-second social media ad for the restaurant.

Spencerville FFA Officers Achieve Gold Level Ratings

Secretary (Emma Schuller), Treasurer (Emma Core) and Reporter (Kayley Kimmet) all received a Gold Rating from the state on their respective Officer Books. Each of these officer's achievements in their respective office allowed for Spencerville FFA to apply for National Chapter Award.

Spencerville FFA Members Earn State FFA Degrees and Await American Degrees Reviews

This year FFA members Cade Elling, Heath Gaskill, and Abigail Schwartz will be receiving their State FFA Degrees during a Virtual State FFA Convention. Graduated FFA members McKenna Jones and Matt Macklin are in the last process of achieving their American FFA Degree that will be awarded at a hopeful in-person National FFA Convention in October.

Spencerville Excels in FFA Contests

While different in how kids prepared, practiced and competed, our FFA chapter was still able to compete in over 10 different contests and this year and hosted the District 4 Job Interview contest. While there are a few contests that our students will still compete in between now and the end of the year, a few highlights for our local students/teams include:

FFA Recognizes Memorial Contributions

Over the past year and half, the FFA has had former members and Alumni pass away and we were fortunate enough to have the families donate their memorials to the FFA chapter. With these memorials, our FFA officers and chapter member came up with unique ways to honor these individuals. Jeff Kill Memorial was used to develop our "Spencerville FFA History of Success" boards in the Ag and Art Hallway that recognizes State and American FFA Degrees. Don Graessle's Memorial was used to purchase new FFA officer stations and a Gavel Set that will be utilized during FFA banquets

for years to come. Max McMichael's and Jim Warnecke's Memorials were used to construct two podiums for the FFA/School that are connected to the local history of the area. Both podiums were built from lumber from donated from Patrick's General Store that stood from the early 1900's to 1970's in Converse.

FFA Alumni Shows Strong Support for Spencerville Students

We are very thankful that our FFA Alumni has continued to sponsor our chapter through funds and activities for our chapter. 

A Rose Between Two Thorns




High school students Ryan Kaverman, Emily Byglin, and Tyler Kaverman met after school for 10 weeks to explore wind as a renewable energy source. Students designed, constructed, and tested wind turbine blades that would produce the most power possible. They focused on the number of blades used, material used, and pitch of the blades which is important for collecting the most wind. After several weeks of blade design trials and tribulations students decided on a pinwheel design. The pinwheel was made out of 7.5 inch square piece of cardstock and hot glue. We entered The Rose in the KidWind Challenge sponsored by Ohio Energy Project. Students will be judged on efficiency, quality, and creativity of the turbine and team name.







The Spencerville Youth and Government students will be participating in their mock legislature in a hybrid form this year. Students have been working all year researching and writing bills. We spent most of December debating these bills, and then this winter was spent editing them to make them stronger after our class debates. We originally had 30 participants who wrote 15 bills to enter into the mock legislature. Unfortunately, a scheduling conflict with athletics has reduced our numbers actually participating to 18 students. We will be submitting 9 of the 15 bills written this school year for debate and passage in the mock assembly. The bills cover a variety of topics including adding a Mental Health class to state curriculum for high school students, restriction on the use of solitary confinement in prisons, and restructuring voter identification to prevent fraud. The students have done a great job choosing a variety of topics that they feel would help to solve a variety of issues in society.

Because of the restrictions of the Statehouse with the pandemic, students will not be able to hold the mock legislature in Columbus this year. The YMCA has worked hard to make an experience that will still allow the students to work with other students across the state but keep them safe from the current health threats. Students will participate in their "committee" sessions through Zoom sessions over the weekend of April 30 to May 2, 2021. They will as pairs serve on different committees where they will present their own bill and defend their position as well as debate bills from others on their committee. If their bills "passes" through their committee, the two students presenting the bill will get to present and defend it again at YMCA's Camp Wilson on May 15, 2021. At Camp Wilson, all 18 students will participate in a full legislature session. During this session, they will debate the bills that have passed through their initial committees. The whole simulation follows the procedures and language followed by our representatives in Ohio's General Assembly.

This whole process is a very hands-on way for students to experience the workings of our government. They learn the value of effective research to defend their positions and the power of negotiation and compromise as they work to pass the bills that they feel are important and to defeat those that are not. They will also get to build relationships with those students with whom they participate in committees from other schools. We want to say thank you to the community for their support during our fundraisers and to the Education Foundation grant for their help in making sure the students were able to participate.

SESA

In March, SESA teacher Rachel Smith visited our 2nd grade classes. She taught them all about the water cycle and how water is an integral part of weather. She also demonstrated different parts of the water cycle and various forms of water. Students were amazed with getting to hold clouds, formed with dry ice. The students even got snow sprinkled on their heads in the classroom! Mrs. Smith showed us all how FUN science and learning can be!


